# Prior to the workshop, participants will read:

"Himalayan Art and Cross-Cultural Exchange" in Himalayan Art in 108 Objects, ed. Karl Debreczeny and Elena Pakhoutova (Scala, 2023, pages 21–27) and browse Project Himalayan Art digital platform. Participants will read assigned titles prior to each day's thematic sessions. See also the institute's select bibliography for additional background readings and resources.

Prior to the workshop participants will prepare brief introductions of themselves, objectives for attending the institute, and the academic project they plan to develop to share with the institute speakers and participants. Participants will confirm that they do not object to being recorded during the institute's sessions.

# Day 1, June 16: Himalayan art and religious imagination, storytelling in symbolic forms

# Morning:

Introductions and Institute overview. Directors and presenters introduce the Institute. Review the day's program. Introductions to participants. **Presentation** of Rubin Museum's ongoing digital projects (Kimon Keramidas) and address questions on using the digital platform, plus a discussion. Small group discussions to facilitate acquaintance within the group and familiarity with the digital platform.

#### Afternoon:

Presentation on symbolic visual language and narrative aspects of Himalayan art (Elena Pakhoutova). Small group discussions utilizing examples from Project Himalayan Art essays on how to meaningfully interpret specific images for various class scenarios and further possibilities of cross-disciplinary connections. Report back and a group discussion about curriculum enhancement and future research presentations.

# Day 2, June 18: Representations of the feminine in Himalayan art, ritual, literature, and popular culture

## Morning:

**Presentations** on divine feminine, ideas and attributes of feminine power, wisdom, protection, fertility, prosperity, and well-being represented in images of female deities and goddesses, their relevance to, or challenge of contemporary ideas (Kerry Lucinda Brown, Jue Liang, Elena Pakhoutova). Q&A with participants.

**Small group discussions** of the materials using guiding/framing questions from presenters as the basis for broader conversation on gender in Himalayan art and its connections across Asia.

#### Afternoon:

A participant-facilitated **panel discussion** led by Sarah Jacoby with a focus on culturally relevant and culturally sensitive matters related to divine feminine or role of women in

Himalayan cultures, including literature and visual arts, to enhance curriculum. Return to the full group, report from each breakout room discussion, Q&A with participants and presenters.

# Day 3, June 23: Living practices: cultural and technological connections through art media

# Morning:

**Presentations** on material and technological aspects of art production, or technology and its cross-cultural nature and human agency (Elena Pakhoutova, Karl Debreczeny). Presentation on woodblock printing in Tibet in historical and social context (Yewong Tenzin Dongchung). Q&A with participants.

#### Afternoon:

A participant-facilitated **panel discussion** led by James Gentry on technology of mass production in Himalayan cultural and religious spheres and its relevance to the present day, including in ritual, social, and everyday aspects of life. **Small group discussions** on technology serving as a means for the expansion of ideas, ideologies, as well as artforms, styles, and methods of cultural production, based on the presented materials and framing questions from presenters. Discussions on curriculum development and potential collaborations. Return to the full group, report from each breakout room discussion, Q&A with participants and presenters.

# Day 4, June 25: Himalayan art and rituals for sustaining the environment and communities

# Morning:

**Presentations** on communal Newar festivals of the Kathmandu Valley and religious festivals in Tibetan, Bhutanese, and Mongolian areas that mark important events in the calendar year and are believed to maintain the local communities' prosperity and well-being (Todd Lewis, Charles Ramble).

#### Afternoon:

A participant-facilitated **panel discussion** led by Huatse Gyal will focus on economy-driven patronage and support for such festivals, including tourism. **Small group discussions** based on presentations and guiding/framing questions with focus on community and environment and integrating of the materials into contemporary discussions about environmental awareness for developing cross-disciplinary syllabi. Return to the main group, report on each group discussion. Q&A with participants and collective thoughts on potential curriculum enhancements and research papers or panels.

#### Afternoon:

A participant-facilitated **panel discussion** led by Elena Pakhoutova will focus on these topics. **Small group discussions** based on the presentations and guiding/framing questions relevant to developing potential curriculum enhancements and planning future research papers or panels. Return to the main group, report on each group discussion. Q&A with participants and presenters.

# Day 6, July 2: Himalayan art and society: Tibetan Buddhism and empires, religions, and nationalism

# Morning:

A presentation focusing on images as representing specific beliefs employed by rulers of Inner Asian empires, from the Tibetan and Mongol empires, to the Chinese Ming and Manchu Qing empires (Karl Debreczeny).

A presentation touching upon religious nationalism and modernity in Himalayan regions, including Tibetan areas, Nepal, Bhutan, and cross-regional currents (Riga Shakya). Q&A with participants.

#### Afternoon:

A participant-facilitated panel discussion led by Gray Tuttle will focus on cross-cultural connections that highlight common approaches to religious ideologies as a means for consolidation of power. Q&A with participants.

# Open discussion:

The presenters and participants summarize the previous days' dialogues into actionable future plans as outcomes in six smaller groups formed by the themes of the institute (attend any or more than one group), conclusions presented to the full forum as next steps in curriculum development and research, such as creating specific thematic units for classes, new courses, and preparing research papers or organizing panels for professional conferences.
