SEE REALITY MORE CLEARLY: RUBIN MUSEUM'S TENTH SEASON OF POPULAR BRAINWAVE SERIES WILL EXPLORE PERCEPTION

Brain Experts Meet Notable Personalities to Illuminate How Experiences and Senses Shape Our Understanding of the World and the Self

New York, NY (December 28, 2016) – The wildly popular Brainwave series at the Rubin Museum of Art returns for its tenth season to investigate the limits and potential of our own perception. Featuring unscripted on-stage conversations, immersive experiences and film screenings, Brainwave brings together experts and notable personalities to peel back layers of thinking and trade insights from science, spiritual teachings, and personal experiences. Notable guests include: *The Godfather* editor **Walter Murch**, chef and flavor activist **Dan Barber**, positive psychologist **Samantha Boardman**, former Sotheby's auctioneer **Tobias Meyer**, and more.

As partisanship, identity politics, and media bias continue to dominate headlines, Brainwave Perception will examine how personal filters shape the way we perceive the world and the self, helping to promote greater empathy and understanding. Taking cues from the Rubin Museum's collection of Buddhist art, current science, philosophy, and spiritual thinking, Brainwave will investigate how perception is formed and forms us.

"The first step to understanding the limits of your own perception is to become aware that those limits are there" said Tim McHenry, Director of Programs and Engagement at the Rubin, who curates the series. "Whether it's a film or a conversation between guests from different walks of life, Brainwave will heighten that awareness, provoke questions, and invite reflection. You will come away learning something new about how you view the world."
